Abstractions of letters of the alphabet are among the structural references and sources of inspiration for my sculptures. I use tarpaper to make models and maquettes, patterns, and molds. Its formability is not unlike that of clay slabs. I generate patterns from sketches of letters. The most promising of those patterns are refined and are used to generate elements of slab-constructed sculptures.
